Local Resources

- 1. **The Children's Spot [Kansas City, MO]-** Provides therapeutic services for children with various diagnoses, including cerebral palsy focusing on early intervention and developmental support.
- 2. Saint Luke's Health System Kansas City
- 3. **Ability KC-** provides a comprehensive, person-centered approach to care that addresses a wide range of needs, from therapy to education, all while focusing on empowering individuals and promoting independence. Offers medical rehabilitation services for children & adults with disabilities, including cerebral palsy.
- 4. **Easterseals Midwest [Kansas City North]** is a nonprofit organization that provides a wide range of services to help individuals with disabilities and special needs. Their programs support people of all ages, from children to adults, with conditions like autism, cerebral palsy, and other developmental or physical disabilities. Easterseals works to create opportunities for individuals with disabilities to achieve their full potential, promoting greater inclusion and independence in their communities.
- 5. **CPFamilyNetwork.org-** A nonprofit organization that provides support and resources for families and individuals affected by cerebral palsy. The network aims to connect families, caregivers, and people with CP to helpful information, resources, and a supportive community.
- 6. TherapyinMotionKC.com- a therapy clinic based in Kansas City that provides specialized services for individuals of all ages, including children and adults. They focus on physical, occupational, and speech therapy to help clients improve their mobility, daily living skills, and communication abilities. Their services are tailored to individuals with various conditions, including developmental delays, cerebral palsy, and other physical or cognitive challenges.
- 7. Acquired Care LLC [Kansas City, MO]- (18+) Consumer Directed Services (CDS) give individuals more control over their healthcare and support, allowing them to choose their own caregivers, including family or friends. The model empowers consumers to manage their own care budget and tailor services to their specific needs. CDS is flexible



and personalized, often offered through programs like Medicaid, and support both the individual and their caregivers. This approach emphasizes autonomy and choice in care decisions. As a provider for the CDS program, Acquired Care hopes to help young adults gain independence when it comes to their healthcare.

- 8. American Canine Training [Blue Springs, MO]- If you are thinking about training a service dog for your family member American Canine Training has been training dogs for over forty years. Instead of waiting for a dog and being on a waitlist for years at a time American Canine also offers free consultations for possible prospects for service dogs.
