

How Children's Mercy Invests in the Community

In Fiscal Year 2020, Children's Mercy delivered almost \$220 million in programs, activities, and services that support the health and well-being of children across the Kansas City region.



FY 2020 Community Investment By the Numbers:

Uncompensated Care | \$104,686,749

Free or discounted care where the recipient could not afford or lacked adequate health insurance and had unreimbursed costs or shortfalls that occur when Medicaid reimbursement is below the cost of providing services.

Subsidized Health Services | \$58,922,139

Clinical services that meet the needs of the region's children despite a financial loss after reimbursement and consideration of charity care are removed.

Health Professions Education | \$17,170,405

Training, clinical rotations, and continuing education for health professionals.

Research | \$20,902,892

Clinical and community health studies and investigations designed to generate knowledge and made available to the public.

Community Health Programs &

Partnerships | \$16,891,827

Programs and initiatives to improve community health beyond patient care activities; includes cash and in-kind services donated to community organizations for a community benefit purpose.

Community Building | \$1,059,199

Programs and/or resources intended to make physical improvements to the environment, provide community support, advocate for community health improvements, and address community-wide workforce issues.
