Giving someone naloxone won't hurt them, so don't hesitate to use it in an emergency. When used properly, it can instantly revive people of any age who are experiencing an overdose until medical help arrives.

What are some signs of an Opioid overdose?

Call 911 immediately if a person shows ANY of the following symptoms:

- Their face is extremely pale and/or feels clammy to the touch
- Their body goes limp
- Their fingernails or lips have a purple or blue color
- They start vomiting or making gurgling noises
- They cannot be awakened or are unable to speak
- Their breathing or heartbeat slows or stops

Opioids are prescription drugs, such as hydrocodone (Vicodin®), oxycodone (OxyContin®), oxycodone/ acetaminophen (Percocet®), fentanyl, and morphine. They are also illegal drugs such as heroin.

How to Avoid Opioid Overdose:

- Take medicine only if it has been prescribed to you by your doctor.
- Do not take more medicine than instructed.
- Call a doctor if your pain gets worse.
- Never mix pain medicines with alcohol, sleeping pills or any illegal substance.
- Learn the signs of drug overdose.
- Learn how to use Naloxone safely
