In addition to psychology interns and post-doctoral fellows, our division includes 5 one-year practicum students from area universities including the University of Kansas (Clinical Psychology, Child Clinical, and Counseling Psychology programs), and the University of Missouri-Kansas City (Clinical Psychology and Counseling Psychology programs). We also host Pediatrics residents for one-month rotations, and these residents spend time with our Psychiatrists, Developmental/Behavioral Pediatricians, and Psychologists in a variety of clinical settings.

The psychology internship at Children's Mercy provides intensive training in psychological assessment, treatment, and interdisciplinary collaboration in the context of a dedicated pediatric academic health care environment. By providing the highest-quality supervision and training, the program aims to facilitate a well-

balanced set of clinical and professional skills to prepare interns for successful careers as psychologists.

The internship is accredited by the American Psychological Association, and is a member of the Association of Psychology Postdoctoral and Internship Centers (AAPIC).
